## **Dysfluency - Suggestions for Teachers**

Do's	Don'ts
<ul> <li>Encourage the child to speak as often as they want. Encourage them to participate in class.</li> <li>Give the child time to respond. Show them that you're listening by having an open posture, maintaining eye contact, and providing non-verbal responses like smiling, and nodding.</li> <li>Ensure the child is aware that you are interested in what they have to say and that you appreciate them sharing.</li> <li>Repeat back what you think the child said to ensure there was no loss of communication.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Pressure the child to speak in front of the class.</li> <li>Disrupt the child when they are speaking to you.</li> <li>Avoid activities that will be difficult for the child. Avoiding it will reinforce negative speech habits and isolate the child.</li> <li>Let the child know that you are anxious, confused, or unsure of communicating with them.</li> <li>Pressure the child to "slow down" their speech.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>When conversing, model good, slow, relaxed speech.</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Discourage any teasing about the child's speech.</li> </ul>
